Minister's Message - Joya no Kane

Before we welcome the New Year, we always hold a big ceremony at the temple. Do you remember what it is?

We hit the bell (Bonsho) on New Year's Eve. We call this "Joya no Kane." It is a traditional Japanese ceremony. Usually, we hit the temple bell 108 times, but most

people don't know where this number comes from. I would like to explain why we hit the bell 108 times.In Buddhist teachings, the number 108 expresses our worldly desires or "Bon-No." We have at least 108 worldly desires. On New Year's Eve, the purpose of hitting the temple bell 108 times is to remove our worldly desires from the old year to welcome the New Year with a pure heart.

Why is the number 108? There are some theories about the number 108. According to a traditional Japanese thought, we have eyes, ears, a nose, a tongue, a body, and a heart, and each part has three feelings:

- 1. comfortable feeling
- 2. bad feeling
- 3. no feeling.

Then, these three feelings have two aspects:

- 1. pure
- 2. unclean.

6 functions of the body \times 3 feelings \times 2 aspects = 36 Plus, three ages are calculated: Past, Present, and Future. 36×3 ages = 108

However, this number should not be taken too seriously. The important thing is that we realize we have many desires that we don't notice. That's why we have this special occasion to reflect on ourselves and try to decrease our desires in the coming year to become better people.

We open the temple and Bonsho area from 5:00 PM to 7:00 PM on December 31st. Please come and join the bell-hitting ceremony on December 31st. Namo Amida Butsu


