#### **New Year's Greeting**

Happy New Year, everyone! At the beginning of this New Year, I would like to extend my best regards to you all.

Over the last year, innumerable people worldwide have been affected by natural disasters, such as earthquakes, floods, and forest fires. I was particularly shocked by the wild fires that devastated the island of Maui in the state of Hawaii. This disaster completely destroyed the temple hall of Lahaina Hongwanji Mission and one temple member was reported to have lost his life. I would like to offer my deepest condolences to all who have perished in those calamities. I would also like to express my sympathies to those who are still coping with the dire situations. It is my sincere hope that all who have been affected will soon be able to return to a normal daily life.

The Russian invasion of Ukraine that began in February 2022 is still continuing. Not only that, conflict between Israel and Palestine has once again flared up from October 2023, embroiling nations concerned with victimizing a large number of people many of whom are civilians. Looking at the appalling state of the world, the following words of Sakyamuni Buddha come to mind. "Everyone fears violence and is scared of death. In consideration of all life, do not kill and do not make others kill."

Every one of us who has received life as a human being, no matter the reason, must be ensured equally of human rights, and no one's life should be threatened. In reality, however, conflicts and terrorist attacks have occurred everywhere in the world and for many people, their right to live and exist has been threatened. As Buddhists who aspire for peace, we must keep Sakyamuni Buddha's words seriously in our hearts and pursue our endeavor of contributing toward world peace and security.

During the last year, we observed the Joint Celebration of the 850th Anniversary of Shinran Shonin's Birth and the 800th Anniversary of the Establishment of the Jodo Shinshu Teaching at Hongwanji, Kyoto for a total of 30 days, divided into 5 sessions during the period from March 29 to May 21. On this occasion, I would like to express my heartfelt gratitude to those who came to Japan to attend, as well as those who supported it in various ways. This celebratory event could be realized only because our predecessors have cherished the Jodo Shinshu teaching as their spiritual foundation for many years no matter when or where they were, and carefully transmitted it to us today.

Let us, too, continue listening to the teaching as the center of our life while cherishing each day.

## **President's Report**

Getting the temple ready for the New Year and preparing for the general membership meeting was a feeling of elation and confidence that the temple was in good hands. We had a terrific turnout to clean the temple! We were finished so quickly as many hands made light work for all.



We held the General Membership meeting in the temple and reviewed 2024 with a recap of our financial position. With inflation and decreasing membership, our financials were about \$60,000 under budget as of the end of November. The biggest two events were the termite treatment that was 50% over expectations, and fixing the Bonsho roof. Together they amounted to over \$86,000. Our Eitaikyo Endowment Fund is progressing well at over \$600,000 with our goal of \$1,000,000 by 2028. We also announced that we were able to lease the old minister's residence to Bridge Tax Consultants LLC starting in November. Thank you for all of your generous contributions and support throughout the year!

I am so grateful for the hard-working board members, members, and volunteers who contribute their time and effort every week so that we may have the viable setting we have. Jodo-Shinshu is all about the experience of having people working together, laughing, and just enjoying themselves—the development of interpersonal relationships, learning from each other's experiences, and understanding the nature and power of gratitude!



#### The Family Memorial Service (Hoji)

Buddhists consider the memorial service a significant occasion to remember the deceased with feelings of gratefulness and love. For Jodo Shinshu followers, the significance of a memorial service is not for appeasing or consoling the spirits of the deceased, but is, rather, the opportunity to pay tribute to and recall cherished memories of the departed while listening to the Buddha-dharma. In other words, the Hoji is not for the sake of the deceased, but is, indeed, for the sake of the living. In remembering the deceased, we acknowledge the influence of the deceased on our lives. (From *Jodo Shinshu – A Guide, p. 142.*)

Extended members of a family and sometimes close friends will gather at a temple or home in memory of a deceased member of the family. Following the service, the family may go out to lunch or dinner or serve a potluck at the home, renewing and strengthening family ties. An important byproduct of this custom has been the reinforcing of family ties with members beyond one's immediate family and a sense of continuity from generation to generation.

Memorial Services are held on the 1st, 3rd, 7th, 13th, 17th, 25th, 33rd and 50th years of passing. After the 1st year memorial anniversary, to figure out memorial service years, start counting from the year of death. Example, for a death in the year 2023, the first memorial anniversary would be in 2024, and the third memorial anniversary in 2025 (to figure out 3rd year anniversary, start with death year 2023 and add 2 more years to get year 2025). Below is the 2025 Memorial Service Schedule. Year 2025 is the Memorial Year for those who passed away in:
