Spring Ohigan



Please join us for our Spring Ohigan service on Sunday, March 30th, at 9:00 a.m.

Spring Ohigan, also known as the Spring Equinox, is a time to recognize and appreciate the harmony of the world around us. "Ohigan" signifies "the Other Shore," a concept central to Buddhist teachings. This special service offers an opportunity for Jodo Shinshu Buddhists to welcome the new season and reflect on its significance.

Occurring twice a year, in spring (March) and autumn (September), Ohigan marks a time when the sun rises directly in the east and sets directly in the west, resulting in equal lengths of day and night. The mild weather during this period creates ideal conditions for cultivating selfless sharing, discipline, diligence, patience, loving-kindness, and wisdom.

For Jodo Shinshu Buddhists, Spring Ohigan is a time for deep introspection, allowing us to contemplate the kindness we receive from others and the world around us. We hope you will join us for this meaningful service.

Minister's Message - Right Conduct

I would like to talk about Right Conduct or Right Behavior, which is the fourth step of the Eightfold Path. Right Conduct means not destroying any life, not stealing, and not committing adultery.



How many of you have never destroyed a life or have never stolen?

Not destroying any life is very difficult for us to live by. If someone says, "I have never killed any living being," I want to ask, "How have you lived until now?" We need to eat in order to survive, which means we rely on the lives of others. But nowadays, we have an abundance of food, so we often forget the significance of this.

One day, a minister asked a child to look at some pictures. First, he showed a picture of a cow and asked, "Is this a life or food?" The child replied, "It is a life." Next, the minister showed a picture of a sheep and asked the same question. The child again replied, "It is a life." Then, he showed a picture of a human and asked, "What about this?" The child answered, "Of course, a human is a life." The final question was about a cabbage. The children all answered, "It is food."

It's easy to separate life and food: if it has a voice, it's life; if it has no voice, it's considered food. This is a general way of thinking.

A long time ago, I went fishing with my family. Kano and Shoshi caught fish for the first time. We brought these fish home and cooked them, but it was difficult because the fish were still alive. I felt guilty. On the other hand, as you know, I have a garden full of vegetables, and it's easy to harvest them. I don't feel any guilt.

However, Buddhist thought teaches that everything in this world has life. Through all things, we survive. The Buddhist word "Engi" means that everything is interconnected.

If we understand that everything is connected, we will never forget to feel gratitude for all things. Even when we have to destroy a life, we should always put our hands together and say, "Thank you." That is Right Conduct.

President's Report

Not that long ago, the Lahaina Wildfires was front-page story. Many of us have friends and relatives who were directly affected by the fire. The overwhelming response to that tragedy was tremendous from throughout the state and many places around the world. The Buddhist Churches of America set up a coordinated effort and sent funds to the Honpa Hongwanji Lahaina Wildfires Fund. Since that time, Lahaina has been starting the road to rebuilding and recovery.




Beyond our wildest imagination, another wildfire in Southern California would be a disaster many times worse than the Lahaina Wildfires. As of January 30th, at least 29 people have died, destroyed more than 16,000 structures, and burned nearly 48,000 acres. The areas affected were the Palisades fire in Pacific Palisades and Malibu, and the Eaton fire in Altadena and Pasadena. The disaster caused \$250 billion in economic losses making it the costliest natural disaster in U.S. history.

The Eaton fire came close to the Pasadena Buddhist Temple. The quick action by neighbors, wetting the hot spots, saved the temple from burning. But 16 Pasadena Sangha members lost their homes. The Pasadena Buddhist Temple suffered smoke damage and will need to be cleaned professionally.


The Buddhist Churches of America has set up the Wildfire Relief Fund. We, at Wahiawa Hongwanji, would like to help in this effort. In closing, we'd like to share BCA Bishop Marvin Harada's words. "Our homes give us a sense of comfort and security. To lose such memories and mementos is like losing a part of our past, our history, our life. What can we say in the face of such destruction? What comes to mind is the Japanese expression, 'You fall down seven times, but you get up eight.' This means that in the face of great challenge, a great loss, and a great tragedy, we just have to stand up again, hard as it might seem, but that is what we have to do."

2024 was the last year of Honpa Hongwanji's 5-year theme of "Building Healthy Sanghas."
