Minister's Message - Rather than trying to become a good person, realizing that I am an evil one is more difficult

I would like to share the article written by Mr. Katsumi Shozo

It seems that nearly every day, startling crimes are being reported in newspapers and on

television. It is unbelievable how many cases are being reported of parents murdering their children, children murdering their parents, husbands murdering their wives, or wives murdering their husbands. Morally, ethically, and legally speaking, those culprits are "evil person." I wonder if this "evil person" and the "evil person" that Shinran Shonin speaks of are the same. My conclusion is a definite No. Shinran Shonin regarded himself as a "foolish being filled with blind passion. "Bonno gusoku no Bonbu."

"Foolish being as expressed in the parable of the two rivers of water and fire, we are full of ignorance and blind passion. Our desires are countless, and anger, wrath, jealousy, and envy are overwhelming, arising without pause; to the very last moment of life, they do not cease, or disappear, or exhaust themselves." [In Ichinen tanen shomon]

I wonder if perhaps there is no connection between this foolish being and myself. For a foolish being, there is not even a one percent chance for attaining Buddhahood. However, the entity whose number one purpose is to save the evil and foolish being is Amida Buddha's Compassion-True Compassion- is such that he cannot but desire to liberate those evil person who have no place to go but to hell. Thus, rather than attempting to carry out good deeds using one's sly, self-power efforts, by turning oneself over one hundred present and leaving everything up to the Buddha, this is the way that the evil person will unmistakably be liberated.

This article remembers me a Japanese poem

Sodatuhodoni Kobega tareru inahokana "The rice ears bow as they grow." We should remember this poem and never forget the feeling of humility.

In late 2024, we joined Aiea Hongwanji's annual mochitsuki to make mochi for the New Year. The United of Oahu hosted the Winter Federation meeting on January 19-20 at Aiea Hongwanji, where we toured the Hōkūle'a at Pearl Harbor, made mochi, and went bowling for some fun.

The Hōkūle'a crew shared fascinating details about life on the vessel, including how they manage food, showers, and sleeping arrangements. We also learned about their use of solar panels and Starlink for safety. We helped the crew by assisting visitors, taking photos, and offering water. Conversations with Emily Lau and Kamekoa from Loko I'a Pā'aiau highlighted the connection between the Hōkūle'a's mission of peace and our own teachings.

Thank you to Aunty Ann and Uncle John Ishikawa, Aunty Joyce Ogawa, Aunty Aileen Sato, Uncle Mark Funasaki, and Uncle George Kawaguchi for making mochi with various fillings, including Koshian, Hershey Kisses, Reese's Peanut Butter Hearts, Peanut Butter, and Spam.

We also received a \$500 Dana Matching Grant for the O'ahu SPCA, our HBY Month charity.
